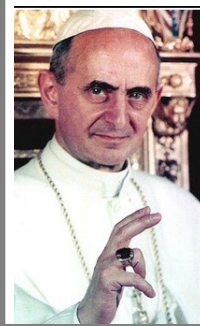

THE BOOK OF PSALMS

The Book of Psalms is also called the Psalter. It is a collection of 150 sacred prayers and songs. It is the longest book in the Old Testament and is the most widely read book in the Bible. It is the only book of the Bible used daily in our liturgy between the use of the Lectionary and the Liturgy of the Hours. It is the most popular prayer book and songbook of Jews and Christians alike. Bergsma and Pitre write "The psalms continue to be the living heartbeat of the Church's prayer to the present day."

In the psalms we unite ourselves in praying the same prayers that Jesus and his apostles prayed. Peter Kreeft wrote: "If we had none of the rest of the Old Testament, but only the psalms, we would still be able to "check it out" and see that Christ fulfilled the Old Testament patterns and predictions."

A Little Bit About the Psalms

The psalms are all Hebrew poetry, not prose. They include several literary "genre", or subject matter and style.

The **Lament Psalms** are cries or petitions to God to come to the aid of the psalmist. Psalms 22 and 38 are good examples. "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Psalm 22)

Todah or Thanksgiving Psalms are almost the opposite of the Laments. These psalms were performed afterwards in thanksgiving and gratitude to God.

Hymns are similar to *todah* psalms but are more general.

Royal Psalms are distinguished by their subject matter- the King, the Son of David. Royal Psalms include 2, 45, 72, 89, 110 and 132. Psalm 72 holds a special position in the Psalter. In it Solomon is crowned as king. It ends with "The prayers of David, the son of Jesse, are ended." David is now dead. (72: 20) These psalms not only describe the history of the kingship of David and his heirs; they point to the Son of David who is to come.

Mt. Zion Psalms focus on the holy city of Jerusalem, the seat of David, and the holy Temple. Jerusalem is on a mountain. Throughout salvation history, "the mountain" was significant. Adam had Mt. Eden; Noah has Mt. Ararat; Abraham had Mt. Moriah; Moses had Mt. Sinai; Joshua had Mts. Gerazim and Ebal. But in the case of Zion, it becomes more than just a place. It is a sign or sacrament of God's covenant with David.

Wisdom or Torah Psalms share the themes of the wisdom literature, and emphasize the wise or righteous behavior expected. They give God's instruction on how to live.

Messianic Psalms of course prophesy or foreshadow the Messiah. All the royal psalms are also messianic. Others are as well, including Psalms 22, 31 and 41.

There are other sub-categories of psalms as well, and certainly there are overlaps. One interesting sub-category is that of the "**imprecatory**" or **cursing psalms**. These psalms include curses against enemies and evildoers. Three psalms, in fact, are not used in the liturgy of the Catholic Church because they are contrary to the teachings of Jesus (psalms 58, 83 and 109) Plus, there are fifteen other psalms that have lines restricted from the liturgy as well. We must hate the sin, but not the sinner. The Old Testament was a time of an "eye for an eye". Not so in the New Testament. Peter Kreeft writes "Everything in Scripture is for our instruction, but not everything is for our imitation."

Authorship

Logically speaking, since the psalms tell of the rise, fall, exile and return of the Israelites, then the psalms could not have all been written by King David. In fact there were several authors of the psalms that were written over the period of 1000-400 BC, that's 600 years. In fact, the oldest of the psalms, Psalm 90 was written by Moses, who lived somewhere between 1500-1200 BC depending on which Scripture scholar you're reading.

David is responsible for somewhere between 70-80 of the psalms. Others were written by people appointed by David to prepare music for liturgies. And many of the psalms were anonymous and written long after King David.
