


So far, 49 parishioners (plus in-pew collections) have contributed \$33,030.00 (70%) of our assessment.

Portfolio of Prophecy

Over the years, we have all heard the prophecies related to Christ's birth and death. Years ago, 1930 to be exact, A.G Sertillanges brought them all together in his book "What Jesus Saw from the Cross". Reading them all in a "life-span" arrangement may prove why the Jewish people knew the Messiah was coming soon. Sadly, not everyone noticed. Prophet after prophet gave us advance warning of the suffering our Savior would endure...for us. Artist James Tissot's picture "It Is Finished" shows the prophets in praise for Christ at the time of the Crucifixion. Read the prophecies and remember.

"The scepter shall not be taken from Judah, nor a ruler from his thigh, till He comes that is to be sent: And He shall be the expectation of nations." (Gen 49:10)

"And thou, Bethlehem Ephrata, art a little one among the thousands of Judah: out of thee shall He come forth unto me that is to be the ruler in Israel; and His going forth is from the beginning, from the days of eternity." (Mic 5:2)

"A virgin shall conceive and bear a son; and his name shall be called Emmanuel." (Isa 7:14)

"For a child is born to us, and a son is given to us, and the government is upon His shoulder; and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, God the Mighty, the Father of the world to come, the Prince of Peace." (Isa 9:6)

"Behold I send my angel and he shall prepare the way before my face. And presently the Lord whom you seek, and the angel of the testament whom you desire, shall come to His temple. Behold He cometh." (Mal 3:1)

"The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light." (Isa 9:2)

"Then shall the eyes of the blind be opened, and the ears of the deaf shall be unstopped. Then shall the lame man leap as a hart, and the tongue of the dumb shall be free." (Isa 42:1-3)

"Behold my servant, I will uphold Him. My Elect, my soul delighteth in Him. I have given my spirit upon Him, He shall bring forth judgment to the Gentiles. "I gave my body to the strikers, and my cheeks to those who plucked them: I did not turn my face from those who rebuked me, and spit upon me." (Isa 50:6)

"They gave me gall for my food, and in my thirst they gave me vinegar to drink." (Ps 68:22, RSV=69:21)

"All they that saw me have laughed me to scorn: they have spoken with the lips and wagged their head. He hoped in the Lord, let Him deliver him: let Him save him, seeing He delighteth in him....I am poured out like water; and all my bones are scattered.... The council of the malignant hath besieged me. They have dug my hands and feet. They have numbered all my bones. And they have looked and stared upon me. They have parted my garments amongst them; and upon my vesture they cast lots." (Ps 21: 8-19, RSV= Ps 22:7-18)

"Surely He hath born our infirmities and carried our sorrows: and we have thought Him as it were a leper, and as one struck by God and afflicted. But He was wounded for our iniquities, and He was bruised for our sins: the chastisement of our peace was upon Him; and by His bruises we are healed." (Isa 53:4-5)

"Thou wilt not leave my soul in Hell; nor wilt Thou give Thy Holy One to see corruption. Thou wilt make known to me the ways to life." (Ps 15:10-11, RSV= Ps 16:10-11)



"Sit Thou at my right hand, until I make Thy enemies Thy footstool." (Ps 109:1, RSV= Ps 110:1)

"Therefore will I distribute to Him very many, and He shall divide the spoils of the strong, because He hath delivered His soul unto death and was reputed with the wicked." (Isa 60:1-4)

"Arise, be enlightened, O Jerusalem; for thy light is come, and the glory of the Lord is risen upon thee. For behold darkness shall cover the earth, and a mist the people: but the Lord shall arise upon thee, and His glory shall be seen upon thee. And the Gentiles shall walk in thy light, and kings in the brightness of thy rising. Lift uo thy eyes round about, and see: all these are gathered together, they are come to thee." (Isa 60:1-4)

"I beheld therefore in the vision of the night, and lo, one like the Son of Man came with the clouds of Heaven, and He came even to the Ancient of Days: and they presented Him before Him. And He gave Him power, and glory, and a kingdom: and all peoples, tribes, and tongues shall serve Him: His power is an everlasting power that shall not be taken away: and His kingdom shall not be destroyed." Philip, the Apostle

In his book *Jesus, Apostles, and the Early Church*, Pope Benedict XVI tells us a few things about Philip, the Apostle.

He always comes fifth in the lists of the Twelve, so he is among the first disciples to be called. He was of Jewish origin, but like Andrew, his name is Greek. He is a native of Bethsaida, and a fisherman.

He heard Jesus speak, and quickly went to his friend Nathanael and told him: "We have found Him of whom Moses, in the Law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, son of Joseph!" To which Nathanael replied: "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" Then Philip posed a challenge: "Come and see." Pope Benedict writes that when reading the Scriptures today, Philip poses that same challenge to us. "Come and see!" Come and enter into contact by listening, responding, and living a life of communion with Jesus day by day.

Philip is seen as being able to communicate with Greek questioners, and perhaps he was also good with figures. When it was time to feed 5,000 listeners, Jesus asked Philip where they could find enough food, and how much it would cost.

And it was Philip who asked a question that provided a moment of revelation. In the Gospel of John, at the Last Supper, Philip asked Jesus: "Master, show us the Father,

and that will be enough for us." That question surprised Jesus, and he spoke sharply to Philip. "Have II been with you for so long a time and you still; do not know me Philip? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father."

It is said that Philip's missionary work took him to Phrygia, Greece and Syria, and that he was martyred in Heliopolis. He was whipped, imprisoned and eventually crucified. Another version of his martyrdom states that he died by hanging.

Saint Philip's feast day is May 3.



The Seven Last Words: The Seventh Word "Father, Into Thy Hands I Commend My Spirit"

When Adam had been driven from the garden of paradise, and the penalty of labor imposed upon him, he went out in quest of the bread he was to earn by the sweat of his brow. In the course of that search, he stumbled upon the limp form of his son Abel, picked him up, carried him upon his shoulders, and laid him on the lap of Eve. They spoke to him, but Abel did not answer. He had never been so silent before. They lifted his hand, but it fell back limp; it had never acted that way before. They looked into his eyes, cold, glassy, mysteriously elusive; they had never been so unresponsive before. They wondered, as they wondered, their wonder grew. Then they remembered: "For in what day soever thou shalt eat of the tree, thou shalt die the death." (Gen 2:17) It was the first death in the world.

Centuries whirled around into space, and the new Abel, Christ, is now put to death by His jealous brethren of the race of Cain. The life that came out from the boundless deep now prepares to return home. His sixth word was a cry of retrospect: "I have finished the work." His seventh and last word is one of prospect: "I commend my spirit." The sixth word was manward; the seventh word was Godward. The sixth word was a farewell to earth; the seventh His entrance into heaven. Just as those great planets only after a long time complete their orbit and return again to their starting point, as if to salute Him who sent them on their way, so He who had come from Heaven had finished His work and completed His orbit, now goes back to the Father to salute Him, who sent Him out on the great work of the world's redemption: "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit." (Luke 23:46)

The prodigal son it returning to His Father's house, for is not Christ the prodigal? Thirty-three years ago He left His Father's eternal mansion and went off into the foreign country of this



world. Then He began spending Himself and being spent; dispensing with an infinite prodigality the divine riches of power and wisdom, and bestowing with a heavenly liberality the divine gifts of pardon and mercy. In this last hour, His whole substance is wasted among sinners, for He is giving the last drop of His precious blood for the redemption of the world. There is nothing to feed upon except the husks of human sneers, and the vinegar and gall of bitter ingratitude.

He now prepares to take the road back to His Father's house, and when, yet some distance away, He sees the face of His Heavenly Father, He breaks out into the last and perfect prayer from the pulpit of the Cross: "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit."

All the while Mary is standing at the foot of the Cross. In a short time, the new Abel slain by His brethren will be taken down from the gibbet of salvation and laid in the lap of the new Eve. It will be the death of Death! But when the tragic moment comes, it may seem to the tear-dimmed eyes of Mary that Bethlehem has come back. The thorn-crowned head which had nowhere to lay itself in death, except in the pillow of the Cross, may, through Mary's clouded vision, seem the head which she drew to her breast at Bethlehem.

Those eyes, at whose fading even the sun and moon were darkened were to her the eyes that glanced up from the crib of straw. The help-less feet riveted with nails once more seem to her the baby feet at which were cast gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The lips now parched and crimsoned with blood, seem the ruddy lips that once at Bethlehem nourished themselves on the Eucharist of her body. The hands that can hold nothing but a wound seem once more the baby hands that were not quite long enough to touch the huge heads of the cattle.

The embrace at the foot of the Cross seems the embrace at the side of the crib. In that sad hour of death, which always makes one think of birth, Mary may feel that Bethlehem is returning again
