



THE SEVEN SORROWS DEVOTION

As we said last week, Devotion to Our Lady's Sorrows is one of the earliest devotions to Our Lady. In the 13th century, Our Lady appeared to the Seven Founders of the Servite Order, giving them a black garment as their habit and asking them to meditate on her Sorrows. This Order has an interesting foundation story. Around 1233, seven wealthy merchants from Florence gave up their wealth and gathered in the mountains of Italy to live a life of prayer, and they dedicated their life to Our Lady. The "Servites" are still active today.

There havealso been several saints throughout the years who had particular devotion to the Seven Sorrows of the Blessed Mother, but one of them, Saint Bridget of Sweden, was visited by Our Lady who made seven promises to those who practiced the devotion to her Seven Sorrows. The promises were:

"I will grant peace to their families."

"They will be enlightened about the divine Mysteries."

"I will console them in their pains and I will accompany them in their work."

"I will give them as much as they ask for as long as it does not oppose the adorable will of my divine Son or the sanctification of their souls."

"I will defend them in their spiritual battles with the infernal enemy and I will protect them at every instant of their lives."

"I will visibly help them at the moment of their death—they will see the face of their mother."

"I have obtained this grace from my divine Son, that those who propagate this devotion to my tears and dolors will be taken directly from this earthly life to eternal happiness, since all the consolation and joy."



The Seven Sorrows, or Seven Dolors, of the Blessed Virgin Mary are:

The prophecy of Simeon foretelling the Passion and Death of Jesus

The flight from Herod into Egypt

The loss of Jesus for three days

Meeting Jesus as he carried his cross to Calvary

Standing at the foot of the cross and witnessing the death of Jesus

Watching as the soldier pierced Jesus's side with a lance and receiving his body from the cross

Seeing the body of Jesus buried in the tomb

On one of the Dominican Friars websites, the Seven Sorrows Rosary is explained for us. "Beginning with the very first sorrow, each of these is connected in some way, either directly or indirectly, to the Passion of Jesus. They also provide us with a unique Marian perspective on some part of this great mystery. For example, consider the third sorrow. We typically think of this event from the perspective of the fifth Joyful Mystery, the finding of the child Jesus in the Temple. The third sorrow, however, focuses on the loss Mary experienced during the three days Jesus was separated from her and Joseph. These three days prefigure the three days Mary would be separated from Jesus while his body lay in the tomb.

Because of this intimate connection with the Passion, devotion to the Seven Sorrows became a common way for people to reflect on the mysteries of Holy Week. Today, the Church no longer celebrates the feast of the Seven Sorrows of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Following the revision of the liturgical calendar, it was combined with Our Lady of Sorrows on September 15th in order to keep the focus of the final weeks of Lent directly on the events of the Passion. But the revision kept the connection between the Seven Sorrows and the Passion because the new feast directly follows that of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on September 14th. Thus, reflecting on the events of Holy Week by meditating on the Seven Sorrows remains a great way to delve deeper into the meaning of Jesus's Passion. Lastly, the most common way of meditating on Mary's sorrows is by reciting the Chaplet of the Seven Sorrows of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which is similar in form to the standard Rosary.

Here's how to pray the chaplet:

Begin by making the Sign of the Cross. Recite the Act of Contrition and say the optional Opening Prayer: My God, I offer you this rosary for your glory. I want to honor your Holy Mother, the Blessed Virgin, by meditating upon and sharing in her suffering. O my Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, trusting in your infinite love I turn to you for forgiveness and mercy.

Then, announce the First Sorrow. Say one *Our Father* and seven *Hail Marys*. Repeat for each of the Seven Sorrows.

Say three *Hail Marys* in honor of the tears which Mary shed in her sorrows. Say the optional Closing Prayer and finish by making the Sign of the Cross: O God, Our Father, from the Passion and Death of Jesus, shared by the compassion of His Mother, You brought healing to fallen man. Grant that we, your people, may experience this healing and rise from the power of sin to a wholeness of life promised by Jesus, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen"

We Care Enough to Give Our Very Best

When we began planning a celebration for our parish's 75th Anniversary, our little committee had grand plans, but first and foremost, we wanted prayer and community to be the major pieces of the plan.

Regarding prayer, one example is the Rosary Pledge. We hear about the Rosary frequently at Immaculate Conception, so it was no surprise that 79 families and individuals signed a pledge to pray the Rosary for the 75 days prior to our anniversary date (September 15th). That means around 6,000 rosaries were said for the future growth in our parish.

Another example of where prayer was important to us was when it came to our parishioners who are shut-ins. Deacon Andy visits over 20 people each month, bringing prayer, Holy Communion, an occasional song, and sometimes even groceries. The Carmelites in our parish prepared a book of prayers for each of them. These prayers included some old favorites, for sure, but also many focused on prayers for those who might be lonely, dealing with chronic illness, and more. For over half of these parishioners, the Carmelites visited them in person. They were asked to join the Carmelites in their prayers for special intentions of our parish, and they were asked if they would like to join in, and participate in our Parish Directory. If they said yes, their pictures were taken, and were included in the Parish Directory.

One of our parishioners, Donna Kersey, wrote a special prayer for the Anniversary that we posted in the Bulletin.

Regarding community, we got approval from Father Burke to develop a new Parish Directory, one that has turned out to be a lot different than any others before it. Thank you to the almost 200 parishioners who posed for pictures or submitted pictures for inclusion in the Parish Directory. Those who did will get a copy of the Directory after Mass starting the weekend of September 13-14th and after the 9am Mass on the 15th, the Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows, and our 75th Anniversary.

We also developed a parish Business Directory where parishioners could advertise their businesses free of charge. Thanks to the 15 business owners who shared their information with us. We plan on keeping this directory updated, so if you want to advertise your business, just send the information to the Bulletin Editor. Copies will continue to be available.

Our celebrations during this weekend are fairly low-key. We had hoped for rented tents, lots of people, and music, but we had to work with who we had, and the number of volunteers was quite small, so we did our very best with who we had, and are quite proud of what we have accomplished.



That seems to be a hallmark of this parish. They always do their best with who they have. A perfect example is our Chapel. Its size matched the number of parishioners. Its simple grandeur matched the love, devotion, and number of parishioners.

The stained glass windows in our 1950's Chapel are beautiful in their reverent simplicity. Each of the windows tells a story of faith.





The years went by, and the only thing that seemed to change was the hair color. He's like the Energizer Bunny, he just keeps moving.


That seems to be a good thing too, because he is always there when you need him.





