



History of the Catholic Church in North Carolina: Belmont Era

Cardinal Gibbons had a dream to bring Catholic education to the children, and a Catholic college for further education. He was easily successful with recruiting the Sisters of Charity of Our Lady of Mercy to come to teach and build hospitals, but it was to the Benedictine Monks to whom he looked for his college.

He recruited Benedictine monks from Philadelphia to come to the area we now know as Belmont Abbey. Five hundred acres had been donated for the purpose of a priory (a place where monks lived) and a college. In 1873, the monks arrived, and the first prior was Herman Wolfe. Many younger monks were willing to travel to the new NC mission. Their numbers grew, and eventually the compound moved up to the status of an abbey in 1887, with Leo Haid as the first abbot.

Only 3 years later, Haid was consecrated bishop over 8 counties in the NC Vicariate. This created an "Abbey Nullius", which is an abbey that does not actually belong to the diocese. It is separate and distinct by its own boundaries from the surrounding diocese. It is governed by an abbot who exercises active jurisdiction over the clergy and faithful in its territory. In 1976, Pope Paul VI declared that no more would be established except for extraordinary reasons, and except for the few with historic importance, they would be phased out of existence. This was a challenge for Haid. He was a monk who lived a secluded life, being asked to live the demanding public life of a bishop. Over the years, the dual position had a serious effect on his success in both areas of his life.

In the early 1900s, there were only 2500 Catholics in the state and only 12 priests. Gibbons felt that bringing in the abbey would also help provide priests to serve in the area. The number of monks grew and by 1910 there were 50 monks at the Abbey Church of Mary Help of Christians.

The College of Saint John became the first and only Catholic College in the state. Eventually the monks moved out of the abbey into the work of building parishes. By 1910 they had 39 churches, 50 missions and 33 priests. (In 1944 the Abbey Nullius was downsized to only one county, Gaston. In 1977, it came fully into the Diocese of Charlotte.)

The Diocese of Raleigh

In 1925, Pope Pius XI established the Diocese of Raleigh which encompassed the entire state of North Carolina. North Carolina was the last state in the Union to have its own diocese. The first bishop of the new

diocese was Bishop William James Hafey, who was 37 at the time, and the youngest bishop in the country. Bishop Eugene McGuiness followed. One of his first accomplishments was to establish the Sisters of Mercy in Wilmington to bring in a Catholic school. His thought was to bring Catholic education to the children.

The fourth bishop of the Raleigh Diocese was Bishop Vincent Waters. He did something that few remember today. If you were born after 1953 you might not have even heard of the event.

In 1953, one year before Dr. Martin Luther King became influential, Bishop Waters stated that Catholic Churches in the diocese would be integrated. In Newton Grove NC, there were two Catholic churches; one for black parishioners and one for white parishioners. The church for black parishioners was shuttered up and Waters said that on a given Sunday, all masses, now to be held in the church that had been for white parishioners, would be

integrated. The two priests assigned to the parish were apprehensive but were going to follow the orders of the bishop. As they were walking toward the church, a black sedan pulled up and out came Bishop Waters. He told the two priests that he would say the first mass and preach at the other two masses. Fourteen white parishioners and twenty black parishioners attended the first mass. The crowds grew outside and became increasingly louder, shouting threats to anyone who attempted to enter the church.

Fewer people attended the second mass, and only a dozen white parishioners attended the third. The event certainly made the headlines, but not a major change in the actual situation of segregation. Bishop Waters stands out today as the only Southern Bishop in the 50's taking a stand on the issue of integration.
